The Department of Modern Languages, Literatures and Cultures invites applications for a two-year teaching term position, subject to renewal, at the rank of Lecturer (or Assistant Professor depending on the qualifications) commencing on April 1, 2025. The minimum qualification for this appointment is a completed doctorate in French studies, though in some cases a Master's degree in the discipline together with appropriate experience may be acceptable. The successful candidate will have a demonstrated record of excellence in teaching French at the undergraduate level. Near native fluency in English is required. The position includes teaching at the undergraduate level (French as a second language, phonetics and Francophone cultures), coordination of the Frecker program in Saint-Pierre, and related administrative duties.
